OHIO BISHOPS ISSUE STATEMENT REGARDING THE SAME SEX MARRIAGE RULING. The United States Supreme Court released its ruling that states are required to license a marriage between two people of the same sex. This is not the ruling hoped for by the Catholic Church, which believes that marriage is by definition between one man and one woman. For centuries, this definition had been universally accepted in virtually all cultures – secular as well as religious. Every nation has laws limiting who can be married and under what circumstances. This is because lawmakers always have understood that marriage does not exist just for the mutual satisfaction of the two people involved, but for the betterment of society. Traditional marriage is the cradle of the family, the basic building block of society. As Pope Francis has reminded us, every child has a right to be raised by two parents, a father and a mother. Both parents are important, and they are not interchangeable. The sad reality that so many child are deprived of this right because of the crisis in traditional marriage does not make it any less important. It is deeply disappointing and worrisome that our courts do not understand this. The Catholic Church remains steadfast in its commitment to promote and defend marriage defined as the union of one man and one woman. With renewed hope, sensitivity, and compassion, the Church will continue to attend to the challenges and hardships that confront individuals and their families, and to treat all persons with the dignity and respect due to them as children of God.

School News, from Mr. Medaugh, Principal:

LOOKING AHEAD: The school dress code has been provided to all parents and students. The dress code will not be a major focus of the Principal's first year. However, that being said, I do intend to educate parents and students about the dress code and I will be dealing with chronic offenders. Not following our dress code makes as much sense to me as joining a basketball team and then complaining that you can't wear roller skates in the game. Our dress code is published in multiple places. Refer to it *before* you go shopping and there should be fewer conflicts and misunderstandings. At St. Rose we believe the dress code enhances the educational climate of St. Rose Catholic School. The dress code reflects neatness, cleanliness, personal modesty, respect for authority and good taste. It emphasizes equality among all students regardless of socioeconomic background. The school dress code allows students to be recognized as individuals more by what they say and do than by what they wear. It is also the philosophy of St. Rose Catholic School that student dress and grooming are reflective of the seriousness with which students approach their academic efforts while in attendance at St. Rose. The Diocese is providing Principal meetings covering school budgets, marketing, accreditation, curriculum, assessments and many other topics, along with another teacher in service at St. Rose. We will be working with our new schedule and on the new computer program. It is a real possibility that in the evenings the finishing touches will be put on the various rooms. The former sixth grade room has been converted into a science lab that is available to all grade levels. A new music/art room has taken the place of the fifth grade room. These rooms are almost finished. The other two third floor rooms have been organized as classrooms. The second floor consists of four classrooms. They have been outfitted with new computers and new computer tables donated by St. Brigid. All they need at this time is the final touches from the individual teachers. The office spaces are being reconfigured and the former Kindergarten room is being transformed into a multipurpose/bookroom space. Mitch Nash had gone above and beyond this summer. He has had to replace old furniture with newer donated items, plus his regular work. When you see the changes made in our school appreciate the fact that for all the new stuff, a mess was created that Mitch cleaned up. In his book "*Living the Mass*" Joe Paparocki deals with how we should utilize our time, talents and treasure. Paprocki writes: "How we use these possessions, however reveals our true attitudes and priorities. He also points

out that all of our income belongs to God and that God recognized that we need a large portion of it for our own needs and for our family's needs. God encourages us to show our gratitude for this gift by setting aside a certain percentage to give back. All of us recognize that St. Rose Catholic School charges a fee our instruction. When we choose not to financially support our school, the money comes from other funds in order to meet our tuition requirements. When the money is diverted from other accounts, it becomes problematic to purchase new equipment, supplies, pay for field trips, and make building repairs. Being a Catholic requires us to make sacrifices in time, talents and treasures. If a Catholic education is truly a priority, then we must be willing to sacrifice a little for this privilege.

You may not be if:

- You have moved from your parental home
 - You grew up here **but** are newly married and starting your own family
 - You are living with your parents **but** are over 23 years of age
 - You are not receiving contribution envelopes
- To register in our parish call the office at 740-342-1348 or stop into the Consortium Office. There are many reasons to actually register in a parish.
- The number of registered parishioners helps the Diocese determine the growth and sustainability of a parish
 - Often if you are asked to be a godparent or sponsor for confirmation you will be asked to provide a letter from your parish stating that you are a parishioner in good standing. While that is simply a form letter, it cannot be issued if you are not in fact a registered parishioner
 - When the hospital calls or if your name is on a hospital list it is difficult to determine exactly who we need to visit if we do not have your name in the "book"

Those are just a few of the reasons it is important to register in the parish.
